The bride is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Gold. She is a 1984 graduate of Fredericksburg High School, and is self employed as a pastry chef.

Mr. and Mrs. F.C. Lochte are the parents of the groom. He is a 1983 graduate of FHS, and is employed in the family business, Lochte Eggs.

Arrangements of lavender and white mixed flowers were place on the altar.

Mrs. John McClusky played traditional nuptial music on the organ. Mark Niles of San Antonio accompanied himself on the guitar and sang "The Wedding Song".

For her wedding, the bride wore a candlelight denier gown created by her mother. The gown featured leg-o-mutton sleeves and a fitted princess-style bodice covered in Norman rose lace. The full waltz-length skirt fell to the scalloped edge of her ankle-high lace-up boots.

In her hair, she wore a lace bow centered with a antique pearl brooch worn at the nape of her neck. She carried a nosegay of silk lavender alstroemeria, white forget-me-nots, pearl stems and purple potpourri sachets.

She was married to Caspar Marschall and they had nine children.

David Braeutigam has located some of the Runnel's descendants. He has talked to a Mrs. Howard of San Marcos, Texas. Her husband was the son of Walter and Bessie Howard. She has already updated her portion of the family history by sending David a letter telling about their life.

David has also located the Swift family. Arthur Swift and Cora Runnels were married in 1904 and had 8 children. David was talking to Vivian Geyer Drake in Austin, Texas and Vivian mentioned that she thought some Swifts lived in Uvalde, Texas. David found the Swifts in Uvalde through a nationwide computerized phonebook. It seems the Swifts also wrote a family history about twenty years ago. They are sending David a copy so he may transfer some of it to the new Braeutigam History. David will also contact the rest of the Swift family for updates, etc.

David has contacted the Baldwin family. Tom Baldwin and Leola Runnels were married in 1910 and had three children. David has contacted a relative to Tom and Leola's only son, Tom, Jr. She lives in Wyoming and will help David with the Baldwin family history.

David is now trying to located the James and Bertha Jennie Forsyth (or is it Forsythe) family. Can anyone help with this family?

David is also looking for the Doss Butler and Lillie Runnels Butler family members. He has talked to Doss Butler, Jr. (from a different mother--after Lillie died Doss, Sr. married a Corby family member) but Doss, Jr. could not remember anything about them. The names of the children are: Margaret Butler-born in 1914 and Maurice Butler-born in 1917. Maurice had two children by Francis Ricks-Elizabeth and Robert Butler. Maurice also had a son, Maurice, Jr., by another marriage. Any help would be appreciated.

David is looking for the families of Albert S. and Annie G. Smith. They had one son named Hampton and lived in Topeka, Kansas. When and where was Albert Smith born and when did he die. Also what happened to Hampton Smith? David has hired a researcher in Topeka to help with this family, but any more information will be appreciated.

David has visited Don and May Belle Beasley's daughter, Florence Beasley Pugh, who just happens to also live in Arlington, Texas! David has loaned her the Braeutigam History (from 1970) for her to read. She is very interested in helping update the Runnels family.

Remember the smallest amount of information can sometimes be very helpful. Just by remembering that *some of the Swifts might live in Uvalde*, that whole family has been located!

H. E. Runnels, Indian War Veteran, Passes

(San Marcos Record, March 30, 1934)

Hardin E. Runnels, 85, Indian war veteran and for 52 years an honored citizen of San Marcos, died at his home, 217 East Hutchison Street, at 12:05 (noon) Thursday, March 29, 1934. He had been in bad health for over a year and his immediate illness had continued for several weeks.

Mr. Runnels was born August 8, 1849 at Brookridge, Va, and came to Texas when quite

young. In his early manhood he served in Company B, Eighth Regiment of Calvary, most of his service being in connection with the suppression of Indian raids on the frontier and he could give many interesting and thrilling experiences which transpired during this period. He retired from active business here some fifteen years ago.

He was married at Fredericksburg October 19, 1880 to Miss Emma Breautigam, to which union was born nine girls. Of these two are dead, Mrs. Lillie Butler and Mrs. Leola Baldwin. Those surviving are, Mrs. Jas. Forsythe, Forest Hill, La.; Mrs. Howard Swift, Uvalde; Mrs. A. S. Smith, Topeka, Kan.; Mrs. Fred Geyer, San Antonio; Mrs. Garnett Smith, Lucas, Ky; Mrs. Walter Howard and Mrs. Don Beasley, San Marcos.

Funeral Services will be at the home at 3:30 p.m., Friday with interment in the city cemetery.
