Johann Wolfgang Braeutigam was born 16 March, 1829 in Kaltenlengsfeld, Germany. Wolfgang was the third child of Johann Valentin and Maria Elisabeth Pfeiffer Braeutigam.

Christine Kensing Braeutigam²

Probably sometime in 1845, Wolfgang's family made the decision to immigrate to the Republic of Texas. After a long journey of approximately three months, the Braeutigam family reached the coast of the Republic of Texas. After a long stay in Indianola, the family was transferred by wagon and foot to New Braunfels. Later the family was one of the first families in Fredericksburg.

On December 12, 1847, the men of Fredericksburg and the surrounding area petitioned the state legislature to form a new county to be called Pierdenalis⁶. Wolfgang Braeutigam's signature along with 149 other men's signature may be found on this document. The legislature agreed and formed Gillespie County on February 23, 1848, in honor of Captain Robert Addison Gillespie, an officer who was killed in the Texas-Mexican War.⁷ Fredericksburg was named the county seat. This allowed official business to be performed in Fredericksburg and not travel the sixty miles to San Antonio.

Wolfgang received town lot #564 located on present day Ufer Street (later called Peach Street) and his mother, Maria Braeutigam, received town lot #395 just north of him on Creek Street.

In 1848, the Texas Legislature renewed the Fisher-Miller grant and certificates. The heirs of Valentin Braeutigam (Wolfgang's father) received the 640 acres of land on certificate number 222.⁸ This entitled the heirs to the land in the Giddings district (later known as McCullough County). Valentin's land was in sections 560 and 561 in Giddings District 3, about 20 miles northeast of the old San Saba Fort. Wolfgang received 320 acres of land on certificate number 756.since he was at least 17 years of age when reaching Texas.⁹ Wolfgang's land was in section 1235 in Giddings District number 3, about 2.5 miles north of the old San Saba Fort.

In 1850, Fredericksburg had a white population of 672.¹⁰ Wolfgang would marry Christine Kensing on 1 September, 1850. Christine was born in the Province of Hanover, Germany on November 26, 1831. She came to Texas with her parents in 1845 on the ship *Gerhard Hermann*¹¹. Her mother and sister died in Indianola of Cholera. In 1846, her father, Fred Kensing, two brothers, and herself, moved to Victoria where her father started a blacksmith shop but died before completion. The remaining three children came to Fredericksburg in 1846¹².

Wolfgang and his wife, Christine, were living with Wolfgang's sister, Anna Hopf, probably on Creek Street.¹³ On May 12, 1851, Wolfgang Braeutigam became a citizen of the United States.¹⁴ On May 30, 1853, Wolfgang sold his 320 acres of land for \$20 to a Mr. A. F. Wrede.¹⁵ Because of the many Indians in McCullough County, Maria Braeutigam traded her certificate of land for a saddle. Wolfgang Braeutigam and his mother bought 99 acres of land on Drei Kricken.¹⁶

By 1860 Fredericksburg had grown to almost 1200 people and the county white population to 2703.¹⁷ Wolfgang Braeutigam and family lived at Grape Creek, just southeast of Fredericksburg. By then the Braeutigams had 200 acres (21 improved and 179 unimproved) of land for cattle, swine, wheat, Indian corn, and sweet potatoes.¹⁸ Wolfgang and Christine had five children by 1860, with two dieing at an early age.

In 1861 Texas voted to secede from the Union, but Gillespie County voted 400 'against' and 17 'for' the secession.¹⁹ This prompted many anti-German feelings throughout the state. Most Germans did not volunteer for the armed services of the Confederacy, but some would volunteer hoping to stay near home and help with Indian defense.²⁰ On 16 August, 1862, Wolfgang Braeutigam is listed as voting for a Brigadier General for the Texas State Troops (a sort of Home Guard for Gillespie County).²¹ Wolfgang is also listed as a private of the 3rd Frontier District, Company C, of the Texas State Troops serving for 8 days at \$2.00 a day. Wolfgang enlisted on 14 April, 1864 in Gillespie County.²²

By 1870, Wolfgang still had 200 acres (55 improved and 145 unimproved) of land for cattle, swine, wheat, rye, Indian corn, oats and sweet potatoes.²³ In March, 1870, Wolfgang bought 640 acres of land closer to Fredericksburg. This land included the abandoned Ft. Martin Scott. During the 1870s Indians were still a major threat to the citizens of Fredericksburg and the surrounding area. On November 1, 1876, a petition was written and signed by the men of Gillespie and Blanco Counties to ask Texas Ranger Captain McNelly for a detachment of men to be place on the border of Gillespie and Blanco Counties because "the State of our Society is such that we need an extreme degree assistance to maintain law and our rights..."²⁴ Wolfgang Braeutigam was one of the men who signed this petition.

The 1880 Agricultural Census list Wolfgang Braeutigam as having 640 acres (45 improved and 595 unimproved). Wolfgang also had:

The 1880s also brought the first County Fair of Texas to Gillespie County. In 1881 Wolfgang Braeutigam had the first Gillespie County Fair on his land.²⁶ Close to present day Highway 290, Wolfgang and his family built a saloon and a small store. Between the two buildings, he built what is said to have been the first dance hall in the county. This was known as "Braeutigam Garten".

In September of 1884, three men entered "Braeutigam Garten" for refreshment. One man demanded Wolfgang had over his money, but Wolfgang refused and reached for his rifle instead. The man shot Wolfgang dead. Wolfgang's youngest child, Henry, was the first to find his father. Wolfgang passed away on the 3rd of September 1884.

The family ran the fair and "Braeutigam Garten" for several more years before finally selling all concessions and closing "Braeutigam Garten".

Henry Braeutigam would later inherit the Ft. Martin Scott property and his mother Christine would live with Henry and his family until the first part of 1923. Christine moved in with her daughter, Mrs. E. Schuchard until Christine passed away on October 18, 1924.²⁷

The Murder Of John W. Braeutigam

Mr. Wolfgang Braeutigam, or John Braeutigam, as he was commonly called, was the owner of a place for entertainment located about two miles from Fredericksburg on the San Antonio road. He was a well-liked person and was about 55 years of age at the time of his unfortunate experience.

On September 3, 1884 four strangers entered his establishment and asked for some drinks. When he served them the drinks, one of the men drew his revolver and sought to empty the money chest. Mr. Braeutigam, who was a courageous man, reached for his musket which was standing in the corner when the robber's bullet struck him fatally. The money till contained only a small sum.

Since the business establishment was located some distance from the nearest residences, it enabled the perpetrators to escape unmolested. One of them was shot by a ranger in the lower country when he resisted arrest. Another was delivered to the local jail and met with death when the jail was destroyed by fire. A few years later the third one was shot to death above Mason and the fourth one, presumably the one who committed the murder, a fellow named Fannin, escaped.
