

IN JULY, 1933, Mrs. Aletha Pearle (Swift) Lockhart went to Virginia, from her home near Longwoods, Maryland, and searched for records of the Swift family in Hanover County, Va. She went to the place where the Swifts for several generations lived and walked over the ruins of her Grandfather's old home in which her father (Francis Marion Swift) and all of his brothers and sisters were born. The family burying ground is still there, only one tombstone left with the inscription barely visible. She also saw where the old St. Martin's Parish Church stood, very near the Swift property. She visited relatives of her father and found that they had a great deal of information in regard to the Swift and Duke families.

The following Swift family history was compiled for Mrs. Lockhart by Rev. S. O. Coxe, Minister Mizpah Presbyterian Church, 1224 East Brookland Park Boulevard, Richmond, Va.---

REV. WILLIAM SWIFT Probably born in Dublin, Ireland, about 1692. Also probably the son of William Swift of Dublin, and his wife, Elizabeth, WIFE dau. of William Longfield. (Grounds of this inference:- William DINAH_----- William. Also a William Swift graduated Cambridge, 1690; had a son, William. Also a William Swift graduated Cambridge, 1718; was ordained to the Priesthood in the Church of England, 1719.) Mr. Swift died in Hanover Co., Va., 1734.

REV. WILLIAM SWIFT received the King's Bounty for Bermuda May 8, 1722. Mr. Swift came to Va. early in 1728 and was assigned to St. Martin's Parish Church by Gov. Gooch. On May 26, 1728, Gov. Gooch writes to the Lord Bishop of London as follows:-- "On his arrival Mr. Swift showed his orders and a letter from your Lordship sent to him in 1726, directing him not to leave that Island until your Lordship had supplied another to take that Cure." Then Gov. Gooch exonerates Mr. Swift of any blame in the matter of leaving without instructions---on the score of a family and the insufficiency of the support from the Bermuda Parish. (Va. Mag. of History, Vol. 32, page 222.)

Mr. Swift visits and ministers in the King William Parish, Goochland County, in 1728 and 1729. (Hugenot Emig. by E. A. Brock, p. 10, 80, 81.)

Mr. Swift receives two permits to patent land by the Col. Council of Va., 6/17/1730, and 12/10/1730. Each permit for 2000 acres on Licking Hole Creek, Goochland County, Va., (Ex. Jour. V. 4, 1721 to 1739.)

William Swift, grantee: deed from Matthew Sneed, dated 11/1/1734, conveyeng title to 130 acres on the South Side of Little River in St. Martin's Parish, Hanover County, same being part of a larger tract, patented by Alexander Sneed. Consideration, Thirty pounds current money of Virginia. Witnesses:-- John Darricott and William Taylor. (Han. Rec. 1733-1735 p. 150.)

Identity of Ruth Swift-----she was probably Ruth Hardin, as the Hardins were neighbors of the Swifts.

PROOFS OF THE RELATIONSHIPS INDICATED IN THESE CHARTS AS REGARDS
CHARLES SWIFT.

That Thomas Swift, Jr., was a son of the Rev. William Swift and Dinah, his wife, is indicated by reference to a deed 3/4/1790 from Samuel Fox to Francis Ratcliff, which land had formerly been conveyed to Fox by Thomas Swift, in which conveyence, Thomas Swift reserves the family burying ground. One of the boundaries mentioned, also, is the "Dinah Swift Old Corner Elm." (Han. Rec. 1787-93 Arch. Dept. State Library.)

That Thomas Swift was the son-in-law of Clevear Duke is shown by a deed of gift from Clevear Duke, of Louisa County, 4/12/1784: "one slave girl to my son-in-law, Thomas Swift; consideration, good will and affection." (D. B. "H" p.470.) Also see the will of Clevear Duke, proved 2/14/1785. For the latter document see Louisa Records, D. B. 3, p. 55.

The earliest documentary record of Thomas Swift, Sr., (other than the indirect reference to his m. to the dau. of Clevear Duke) is a deed of gift, in 1757, from John Cosby, Louisa Co., consideration "good-will and natural affection" (Louisa D. B. "B" p. 252.) In this document Thomas Swift is of St. Martin's Parish, Hanover County.

In 1760 Thomas Swift appears in Patrick Henry's "Store and Fee Book.

In 1786 Thomas Swift, Sr., makes settlement as "surety" in the administration of the estate of Richard Pickering and Lucy, his wife, (There is evidence here that Lucy Pickering, wife of Richard Pickering, was a sister of Thomas Swift.) Rhoda and Mary, daughters of Lucy and Richard Pickering, m. Samuel Fox and Peter Foster, respectively. (Hanover Records, 1785-1792, part 1, p. 162.) This record bears the following endorsement by the Court:--"Delivered to Thomas Swift, Jr., by order of Thomas Swift, Sr."

Thomas Swift, Sr., is the only "Swift" in the land tax records of Hanover County from 1782 to 1790---the earliest tax records extant. Through this period he pays taxes on 550 acres.

In 1790, according to a notation of the tax commissioner, Thomas Swift, Sr., conveyed 100 acres to Clevear Swift. The item reads:--"To Clevear, of Thomas Swift, Sr." which must mean "To Clevear, son of Thomas." At the same time, and according to the same evidence, Thomas Swift conveyed 50 acres each to John Hall, Samuel Fox and Peter Foster. (Taxed on 300 acres for 1791.)

From 1782 (earliest personal property tax records) to 1792, Thomas Sr., Clevear and Thomas, Jr., all appear in the personal tax records--but no other Swifts. Note: -- Only Clevear (Clessear) and Thomas, Jr., appear in the 1790 Census.--Explanation:-- Clevear is the "head of the house" and his father doubtless an invalid in his (Clevear's) home.

Thomas Swift, Sr., died early in 1792, for although he pays a personal tax for that year, his estate pays the land tax.

After the death of his father in 1792, Thomas, Jr. never appears again in any of the tax records, which means that he removed at that time, with his family, to Kr., where he was pensioned in 1818.

From 1793 to 1812 inclusive, the estate of Thomas Swift, Sr., pays taxes on the 300 acre tract of land. Evidently his widow survived until 1812.

From 1793 to 1801 inclusive, only Ann Swift, widow of Clevear Swift, paid a personal property tax, while the estate of Thomas, Sr. (300 a.) and the estate of Clevear (100 a.) continued to pay the land tax.

Ann Swift, widow of Clevear, continues to pay personal property tax on a considerable number of slaves and other property up to 1833. In the meantime, the estate of Thomas Sr., was transferred to the estate of Clevear (in 1813), together with an additional 86 acres from some other source, and so continues at 486 acres through 1833.

Also, in the meantime, the sons of Clevear (d. 1796) and his widow Ann, come into the personal tax records, Archibald in 1802, Charles in 1806, Thomas in 1810, and William in 1812. (See the foregoing for their marriage records &c.) Now, that these are the sons of Clevear and Ann is evident from the following considerations:--

First, note that the above lands constitute the only Swift land estate in Hanover County for the period under consideration. Secondly, note that only Clevear, through his life, and his widow, Ann, after him, payed a personal property tax in Hanover County from 1792 to 1802 -- no other Swift in the record for that period. Third, note that Archibald, Charles and William appear uniformly with Ann Swift --- that is--- the tax commissioner's records concerning them are of the same date and associated with no names in between. And the exception of Thomas is accounted for on the assumption, for which there is good evidence, that he, with his wife, Ann Burch, made their home on a 335 acre farm which descended to her from her Grandfather's estate (David Anderson, the father-in-law of Benjamin Burch)--- this farm being two or three miles from the old Swift home. Charles remains after the others married and moved to Louisa County.

Also, by the process of elimination, we are brought to the same conclusion; the second generation children of the other branches of the family are accounted for elsewhere.

And again, with reference to Charles Swift, the recurrence of the name "Clevear" among his children is an indication of a close relationship between Clevear (d. 1796) and Charles (1808 personal tax). And, in the circumstances, the only close relationship is that of father to son.

Another significant fact is:-- Immediately following the death of Ann, (1833) the widow of Clevear, and the closing of the estate of Clevear in 1835, 135 acres was transferred to Christopher Goodman, and the remainder to Thomas Swift who had married Ann Burch in 1812. Charles Swift drops out of the tax records, his last tax record being for the year 1835. No doubt the settlement of the estate of his father facilitated his removal to Tenn., just as the death of his grandfather, Thomas, Sr., in 1792, with a partial settlement of his estate, was the occasion for Thomas, Jr., to go to KY.

1/4 RICHARD MERCER SWIFT'S first wife, Harriet Swift, died in 1842, leaving four children, the youngest two months old. On October 12, 1853, he married Mrs. Letitia B.
